The World Aquaculture Society held its 18th annual meeting in Guayaquil, Ecuador January 18-22, 1987. Nearly 1300 registrants from 37 countries attended the conference which included technical sessions on shrimp, mollusc, and finfish culture and special sessions on technology transfer and the hatchery, nursery and pond culture of penaeid shrimp. The conference arranged several pre and post conference tours of commercial shrimp facilities in Ecuador giving attendees a unique opportunity to visit some of the best commercial shrimp culture operations in the world. The annual business meeting was used to announce the affiliation of the Caribbean Aquaculture Association (CAA) with the WAS and the results of the recent elections.
